Pastor Karri's Big Adventure

Several years ago when my sister lived in New Jersey, I went to stay with her while I was attending a conference in New York City.

"Now, tell me again. Which train are you going to take into the city?" "The NEW! JERSEY! TRANSIT!" I recited once again to my baby sister as I rolled my eyes. "Good grief", I thought, "how many times did she and my brother-in-law think I needed to be told which was the right train to take from the station at Trenton into New York City? After all, I was an adult, I'd been to New York City before, and if nothing else, I could certainly read!"



So, I kissed her goodbye, assured her once again I would be fine alone, jumped out of the car and proceeded into the station to spend a good ten minutes trying to buy my train ticket out of the machine that my brother-in-law had warned me the night before to avoid. "If you don't know how to use the machines it's usually faster to just wait in line at the ticket window", he had told me. "Big deal", I thought as I remembered his warning, "so it took me a few more minutes than it would have at the window. I still have plenty of time to get to the train. And besides it made me feel like a real New Yorker to use the machine!"

I took my ticket for the New Jersey Transit, bought a cup of coffee and a pastry, and I proceeded to the boarding area. As I started to board the train, I asked a businessman who was boarding if this was the train to New York City. He told me it was as he bustled past me onto the train and I followed him on. I found my seat, settled in and was pleasantly surprised by how nice the train was. It was very clean, there was a drop down table from the seat in front of me (just like they have on airplanes) where I put my coffee, and the seats reclined! There was even a place where I could plug in my laptop computer. As I sipped my coffee and watched the countryside glide by I thought to myself "Wow", I could sure get used to this if I had to take the train into work every day! A whole uninterrupted hour to read, sleep, work, contemplate" I wasn't quite sure why I had heard so many criticisms of the train ride into New York City. For me, this was absolutely wonderful!

After a few stops at other stations, the conductor finally came through to take the tickets. I watched closely to see what everyone else did so I could make it look like I too was an experienced train rider. When the conductor asked for my ticket, I casually handed it to him with a slight smile on my face. (I didn't want to look too Midwestern by having a big grin). "I'm sorry ma'am, but this isn't the right ticket." Immediately I started to panic, dropped my cool demeanor and pointed to the guy in front of me and cried, "But he told me this train was going to New York!" "Oh, this train is going to New York alright, but this is the Amtrak, not the New Jersey Transit."

Panicked I asked him, "Now what do I do?" "Well", he said, "normally I would make you buy a ticket for this train (only about \$50.00 more than the ticket I had!) but... I'll let it go. Just make sure you board the New Jersey Transit for your trip back." I took a deep sigh and you can bet I paid close attention to which train I boarded for the ride back to Trenton!

The whole experience was extremely humbling...especially when I had to admit to my sister and brother-in-law that I hadn't really followed any of their very specific directions!

We do this a lot in life don't we? We think we know where we're going and how to get there and we don't really need God's help. We don't always listen to God's words of loving guidance for our life's journeys, words that are meant to make it easier for us. The good news is, however, that even if we get on the wrong train, our God is there to help us get back on the right one and through grace the price of our ticket has already been paid.

In this time of discernment, I hope this community at St. Stephen will realize that we need God's help. I hope we will closely listen for God's direction for the future. And along the way, I hope we will find the joy that comes with knowing we are on the right train.

President's Message

Transition is the word we apply to much of what is going on at St Stephen. Last year was certainly a year of huge transition, with Pastor Jim's retirement after a long tenure as our lead pastor. Then we transitioned through two interim pastors and made changes to our stewardship and finance ministries. And this year, without question, we will witness even greater transition as by midyear we will be accustoming ourselves to the new lead pastor.



Transition is coming in other ways, too, and that is what I want to share with the congregation in this message. There will be changes in how we *outreach* and how we *in-reach*.

Even before a great number of our members participating in the cottage meetings and survey for the church's mission site profile last year responded by insisting that better outreach be included in our future, your church council had targeted it as a goal that provided multiple benefits for the church. Better outreach will expand our mission and ministries. It will make positive impacts on our surrounding community and more people in the community will know about us. It will grow our membership. And with greater membership the resources we need to serve our mission—financial *and* people resources—will increase. Outreach needs more attention and is to be a focus of your church council in 2024.

But so is *in-reach*. By this I refer to the attention we give each other.

When the pandemic struck it knocked us off our game and we've been slow getting back to where we once were. We don't come together enough in fellowship or learning or service like we used to. We need more purposes for gathering. We need to put events back on the calendar, like Nordic walking, the progressive dinner, game nights like Bunco Night, fellowship outings, and more forums at which our members share stories about themselves like the presentations Brad & Ruth Wilm and Tom & Cindy Scott gave about Costa Rica. This is the *in-reach* we used to have and now wish to transition toward.

St. Stephen's mission statement includes a vision: *to move forward in faith together by living lives of worship, fellowship, service, and learning.* It's great when we see each other at worship each week. It's how we grow in faith. But we grow in faith also when we gather for the other three parts of our vision.

Kingdom Restoration Ministries

For several months we have been providing space in our building for Kingdom Restoration Ministries to hold worship services other and its gatherings. KRM is a church that shares our traditional Christian values as it seeks to establish itself with a greater presence in the community. On Saturday, March 9th, KRM held a 3-hour meeting and workshop in our fellowship hall to share its goals with its followers,



one of which is to encourage immigrants to integrate into a strong and cohesive community and raise children that won't become a burden and liability to society. We look forward to continuing our relationship in faith with KRM and its pastor, Thomas Dowie.

CALL COMMITTEE UPDATES

Greetings to our St. Stephen family during this season of Lent. Work continues towards our goal of calling a new pastor in early summer. In the past few weeks we've been busy! Our mock interview, conducted on February 13, provided good feedback which will help assure our interviews are successful. We met with Rolf, our Synod representative, on February 29. Two recommendations were made by members of the congregation, however, upon reaching out Rolf learned they are both happy in their current calls. He provided us with the names of four Synod recommended candidates. These folks have been contacted and we have interviews scheduled via Zoom between March 10 and March 25. After these interviews are completed, the

committee will determine which candidate(s) will move on to a second, in-person, interview. As always, please contact any member of the committee with questions, comments or concerns.

CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE

At the March 11 church council meeting the following items were discussed:

- The February treasurer's report reflects the success of the Generosity Challenge in its first two months, reducing our General Fund deficit from \$50,408 to \$30,260.
- ♦ A Call Committee report was given, highlighting the progress of the pastoral call process. One candidate interview has been completed and three more are scheduled before Easter. The expectation is that one or two candidates will be chosen for second interviews in early April and an offer will be extended to the committee's selected candidate by the middle of the month.
- The council gave its support to a program called a Youth Covenant Partnership in which St. Stephen youth will develop relationships with other church members to seek spiritual and financial support on their faith journeys.
- ♦ The council retreat will be held on March 21st, with its focus on brainstorming ideas for becoming a more welcoming church and growing in our outreach in 2024.
- The council continued its discussion of ways church expenses can be reduced to make our finances more sustainable.
- Representatives to this year's Synod Assembly were identified, to be held at St. Andrews Church on May 10-11. The May 10th agenda includes a worship service to which all our church members are invited.

Nordic Walking Club (4/30-8/27) (((Sign Up Now)))

The Nordic Walking Club is for all ages of members of St. Stephen and their friends. Dogs are welcome, too. What



is Nordic Walking? It's a hiking option—not a requirement—popular in Scandinavian countries in which walkers hike with the help of some kind of poles, like those used in Nordic skiing.

The club will meet this year on Tuesdays (7:00-8:00pm), starting on April 30th, with a projected season-end-date of August 27th. Our walks are between 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 3 miles in length. Each week we choose a different walking location to vary scenery and terrain. Some locations have advantages with respect to bird watching or appreciation of flora.

ALL walking speeds and fitness levels are accommodated. We use "group compaction", which means if we get spread out our pace is adjusted to keep the group together. One of our favorite routes is out-and-back on Lake Avenue starting at Kowalski's, allowing members in the group to choose their turn-around point.

More detailed information, including a schedule of where we will walk each week and directions to find the walking spots, can be found in a packet on the welcome desk. Please stop at the desk to pick up a copy. The information has advice about shoes, clothing, sunscreen, etc. There is also a sign-up sheet so we know who to contact with weekly reminders and further information as it develops, such as cancellations due to weather.

We hope to see many of you on the walks this summer. Please come for the exercise, fresh air, and fellowship. Questions? Ask Ted Field. If you are in need of hiking poles, he can advise you where they can be purchased.
