Pastor Karri's Message "Blessings in Community"

A friend of mine had a quote scrolling across her computer screen a few years back that said: *"How many times do we miss God's blessings because they are not packaged as we expected?"* That quote has stuck with me over the years and I have found that it helps to remember it when I'm feeling busy or overwhelmed. It seems that too often when I'm busy I forget to slow down and take time to look around me and see the blessings that God continually grants.



Soon we will be thrown into the middle of another summer...and with it come the joys of sunshine, family vacations, freedom celebrations and no school! We try to find time for extra rounds of golf, family gatherings, trips to the beach or afternoons in the garden. We enjoy bright sunshine, cool evening breezes and a summer's rain shower. In a time that most people associate with vacations and relaxation, we can also find ourselves the busiest; arranging child care for kids who are out of school, endless planning for vacations, packing the car for a weekend at the beach or preparing meals for large groups of people as we take advantage of gathering during the short months of Minnesota summers. Let us use this time to discover and celebrate the blessings in community that God has showered upon us.

President's Message

We are active in our church life for a variety of reasons. We are people of faith who like to worship together regularly. As church members we find opportunities to help others and use our talents to make a difference in the world. We enjoy the fellowship of people who believe as we do. If asked by a non-church goer why we are active members of St. Stephen, those are some of the answers we would give.

We watch what is happening in the world and in our surrounding community. The ranks of non-believers is growing. An estimated 40 million people have stopped going to church in the past 25 years. Many among them would give as reasons churches are irrelevant, or they are too judgmental, or they offer nothing to make their lives better. But they are likely to miss an important point, which is that church is a community and it is vitally important for all people—believers and non -believers alike— to be part of a community that is not their immediate families.

The emphasis on community should never be overlooked. It's never been as important as it is now. We live in an age of declining face-to-face socialization. People are less civically engaged and feel less satisfied with their social life. They have a hard time finding places for collective life. As people push themselves away from a church, they choose non-communal replacements, relying on technology like smartphones to find purpose in life, missing the point that to stare into a piece of glass in our hands is to be removed from our bodies. It's a solitary engagement.

Our religious rituals are the opposite of this in almost every respect. They put us in our body. Many of them require movement that is devotional, like when we kneel at the communion altar, or stand in the pews to sing together or share peace greetings with others around us. Together, we speak creeds and psalms aloud. The rituals require us to set aside time each week for prayer, reflection, or worship gathering. We don't complain, but rather appreciate that our rituals force us to separate ourselves from our daily habits and take a scheduled break from our digital devices.

But, most importantly, we find community in our life at St. Stephen. We make contact with the sacred in the presence of other people, whether in church or over a dinner-table prayer. Our religious rituals are embodied and collective.

Everyone needs community in their lives and St. Stephen provides needed community for us. Our mission statement reminds us of that. We are a Christian *community*. We don't bring God's love to the world as individuals. And at a time when socialization is on a decline, our rituals create the collective life we badly need.

If asked by a non-church goer, *"why do you attend church?"* our first answer should be to do good as part of a community, and the good for us happens to be God's work. Then, we should ask, *"What's your community?"*

Synod Assembly Report

Pastors Karri and Juli, Ted Field, Marla Amborn, and Denise Ashley attended the St Paul Area Synod Assembly May 10 and 11. A few brief notes: The worship was amazing. Musicians and choirs from around the synod led amazing music and singing; the liturgy was beautiful, the speakers were inspiring. This was truly a highlight. Pastor Juli attended the discussion of the proposed social statement on civic life. It was lively and well worth attending. Many different issues were raised, and many different viewpoints represented. The draft statement is still available online (https:// download.elca.org/ELCA%20Resource%20Repository/Civic Life and Faith Draft.pdf) and feedback is welcome via email until September 30. More information is available (https://elca.org/ civicsandfaith). The Synod welcomed a new congregation, Eternal Flame, with great celebration. This is a vibrant and growing community of predominantly Hmong ethnicity. The Synod shared the progress in the Planting Hope project. In this endeavor, the Synod has committed to involvement in a neighborhood on the East Side of St Paul, offering partnership, funding, and other investments. Lutheran Social Services announced that the Family Center has grown into a full pre-school and early learning center. There is now enough money for paid summer internships for five years. More information is available (<u>https://spas-elca.org/planting-hope/</u>). Finally, there was a very large and vibrant Mission Fair, showing off all kinds of organizations doing good work in the community. Expect to hear more about these in coming months; we are inviting some to come and speak at St Stephen in the coming year. One of these organizations is Lutheran Social Services – they asked that everyone come out to their inaugural "LSS Night with the Loons." Register to attend a MN United Soccer game at the information desk in the lobby, or by calling the church office.




