Our pledges are distributed as we choose to four different funds, as follows:

Current Fund is the fund to pay for the church's mission, for staff salaries, utilities, maintenance and operating costs, and supplies all our ministries require.


Capital Fund pays for major property improvements like furnace replacements and roof repairs, all the things that create the comfortable space and setting needed for our mission work

Benevolence is the fund to support ministry work outside our church walls, including support of the ELCA, St. Paul Area synod, Tanzania, and other mission work.

Cash Reserve Fund is the fund that ensures we maintain cash flow. It's an emergency fund and we use it every year during those times our giving falls behind the church's needs.

Stewardship Is About Our Need To Give As Disciples. It's Not Fundraising

A conversation about stewardship doesn't have to include finances. It is not an occasion to talk about budgets, deficits, fundraising, or the church's need to receive. Instead, it is a celebration of the many blessings in our lives and our need to give in response to those blessings. We pledge as an expression of the gifts we have received. But at the same time, it is important that we know where our pledges go to Bring God's Love To The World. The graph follow shows how St. Stephen uses our gifts proportionately.



Pledge What You Can

Pledging allows the church to know the financial support it will receive in the coming year and plan its ministry work. Please pledge what you can. It is not an ironclad obligation, but a measure of your intent to show the extent of the blessings you have received.
